# Foreword

2014 is our seventh year since the Kingsbridge in Bloom team was formed and it has been another busy year for us.

We were delighted to have been chosen for the Champion of Champions competition this year and believe that our new displays, on going community involvement, commitment to care of our heritage sites and general pride in our town with our It's Your Neighbourhoods, will shine through in our entry.

Over the past few years our display planters have suffered from the vagaries of the weather so last year through careful control of our finances we made a commitment to purchase new hardware which will take us well into the future with confidence.

We are truly an all year round working team, and operate on a relatively small budget, raising much of our own funding through our 100 Club monthly prize draw and events throughout the year, as well as ongoing support from our Town Council and our many businesses in the area. We also have a good working relationship with our District Council Ground Maintenance Team and support one another.

Our baskets and displays are planted by the dedicated KIB team, as well as our watering and on going maintenance in order to keep our costs down. The majority of our display hardware now feature water retention reservoirs.

All of our green waste material is recycled in conjunction with our District Council Ground Maintenance Team.

Kingsbridge in Bloom are very proud of their achievements in the town and take wonderful comments for many of our residents and visitors throughout the year.

The Kingsbridge estuary and surrounding area of the South Hams is an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty and we are very proud to be able to help keep our town vibrant and attractive by taking advantage of this natural resource. The recent significant investment by the Harbour Authority in new berthing facilities for local and visiting boats in the town is testament to this.

We also believe that Kingsbridge is a model for Britain in Bloom in terms of community involvement and working together for the benefit of everyone.

Most of all we enjoy what we do!





# Horticultural Achievement (Section A)

When Kingsbridge in Bloom was formed, we made a conscious decision to plant sustainably and our design for displays around the town have proved to be an excellent strategy. Additionally, most of our verges in the town have been planted with meadow & wild flower seeds as appropriate, which give a spectacular display of colour to lift the spirit.

We do recognise, however, that for maximum impact, it is necessary to plant annuals in hard landscaped areas so appropriate planting is also carefully considered for each area.

All of our planting is carried out by ourselves including our baskets.



Our businesses, churches, schools and public houses are very supportive and help to improve our various open spaces of the town.



Within Kingsbridge there are many fascinating gardens, both big and small. Ranging from immaculately tended to the more natural and wildlife friendly.

As an organisation, Kingsbridge in Bloom hold an annual garden competition, where members of the KIB team judge these hidden treasures.







Good practices of rainwater use, sustainable planting, effective composting, wormeries and bee friendly planting are all evident in the Kingsbridge Community Garden. This hidden gem is well used and supported by the wider community of all ages.

Also in the town is an area where you will find old bathtubs, carrots, bees, corrugated iron, 12 foot sunflowers, innovative irrigation and homemade scarecrows - The Kingsbridge Allotments, managed by Kingsbridge Town Council. The allotments have an ever growing waiting list and are well used by all plot-holders.





# Environmental Responsibility (Section B)

In Kingsbridge we have a number of heritage sites which we have regenerated as well as wildlife areas and natural habitat. Rather than overhauling the natural sites within the town, Kingsbridge in Bloom have worked to enhance the existing features with new additions such as planting of wild flowers in Briton's Field and highlighting the role of the railway branch line that used to run to the town by regenerating the old railway bridge on Plymouth Road.



South Hams District Council have invested in a green waste machine which will be used as part of a new recycling point within the Recreation Ground. The design scheme for this facility is ongoing and it is planned to be completed in 2014. Kingsbridge in Bloom recycle all of it's current green waste and does utilise the green waste machine alongside South Hams District Council who transport the waste to the machine's temporary home.

The planting of our displays are designed in such a way that minimises the requirements for water and compost. All our plants are appropriately recycled or composted as and when required.

Across the South Hams a total of 54% of all household waste is recycled or composted, South Hams District Council is one of just 3 districts in the South West in Bloom area to recycle or compost greater than 50% of it's waste. Kingsbridge in Bloom have played a part in making sure that the composted waste is stored for use in a safe place within the Recreation Ground.

Since Kingsbridge in Bloom started, we have made every effort to influence the reduction of fly-posting, graffiti, litter and we also played a role in developing the new Dog Control orders to reduce the level of dog fouling within the town.

In conjunction with Kingsbridge Town Council, we have been responsible for systematically introducing new cavendish style seating and replacing old benches with the new style. We have also worked alongside the Town Council with an Art in the Park project which has been installed by students at Kingsbridge Community College. Other art within the town also includes the Community Mosaic which has been installed on the side of Peacocks shop front in Fore Street.









# Community Participation (Section C)

The community give great support to Kingsbridge in Bloom, in particular the working parties and involvement from the primary school.

Development of our existing and new heritage sites is ongoing and each managed by a small group of Kingsbridge in Bloom volunteers who's pride in their work regenerate the sites to such a high standard.

Within Kingsbridge there are 7 It's Your Neighbourhood areas this year, with a further 2 more starting later in the year, the continued participation by members of the local community keeps areas not currently tended to by the Kingsbridge in Bloom team looking great. As part of the wider community participation, the team run an annual competition where the hidden garden treasures of the town are judged by the Kingsbridge in Bloom team.

Strong engagement and communication with the local schools means that the involvement remains at a high level and their own projects complement their curriculum.

We have a good connections with the local newspapers and free magazine that are distributed door-to-door throughout the area.

The dedicated Kingsbridge in Bloom team work year-round to ensure that all areas worked on are kept in good order with appropriate planting throughout the year.

Support from Kingsbridge Town Council and the business community is crucial in raising a significant percentage of funding required by Kingsbridge in Bloom, other fundraising initiatives include the 100 club and specific events such as quiz nights.

The enormous efforts of the Kingsbridge in Bloom team have played a major part in keeping the town attractive and vibrant. Their dedication is very well appreciated by both residents and visitors of all ages. We particularly appreciate the support of the younger members of our community who are keen to keep involved.

It is the national standard for parks and recognises well-managed, high-quality sites, with community involvement.

All Green Flag Award-winning parks and green spaces are entered into the annual People's Choice Award vote.

Last year saw thousands of votes recorded and the ballot resulted in the crowning of Victoria Park in Tower Hamlets as the Choice.

The Green Flag Award scheme is licensed to Keep Britain Tidy, from the Department for Communities and Local Government, and managed across the UK in partnership with Keep Scotland Beautiful, Keep Wales Tidy and Tidy Northern Ireland, the Federation of City Farms and Community Gardens and the National Housing Federation.

Making it something that everyone can enjoy on their way home.

Kingsbridge in Bloom have been very helpful in offering advice and have recommended setting up a "It's Your Neighbourhood" project scheme for the area. Similar schemes have included the old Dodbrooke Cattle Market site on Church Street, the Old Lime Kiln next to the Quay Car Park and the Old Primrose Line Railway Bridge.

There will be an informal meet and greet at Abbeyfield House, Saffron Park on Wednesday October 2 at 2pm to try and find a way forward for the project. Everyone is welcome along.

## Working together for summer blooms

THE Kingsbridge in Bloom team have been out in force preparing planters and open spaces - and enjoying a Good Friday fun day at the recreation ground.

The day involved a team of volunteers and 30 children, who each planted a sunflower. The idea is to see whose flower grows the tallest.

Chairman Graham Price said: 'As part of the 50th anniversary of Britain in Bloom, all participating towns were asked to plant sunflowers in celebration.'

Mr Price also described the group's other activities this year: 'South Hams Council have been preparing verges for our meadow seed planting and we will be sowing in the next week or so.'

'Our meadow seed planting will be co-ordinated throughout the town, as well as a stunning summer display of poppies commemorating the one hundredth anniversary of the first world war, which will be displayed in the horseshoe beds on the Embankment.'

The organisation also works with 'It's Your Neighbourhood' groups within the town who take care of specific areas. There are currently eight groups, and more due to get involved in 2015.

Mr Price said: 'Most of these have a real story behind them and one is the latest group to join, the Saffron Park Gateway Community Garden.'

The garden, at the entrance to Saffron Park, has been adopted by a team from the local community with the aim of making it an attractive and colourful space.

Councillors Rufus Gilbert and Julian Brazil have pledged funds towards the work and Kingsbridge Town Council have also made a grant.

Gardentime Garden Centre helped by donating £300 worth of plants and compost.

Garden designer Alice Blount said: 'I have put together a planting plan using the purples and yellows of crocuses as the colour theme to help unify this patch of ground with the other 'It's Your Neighbourhood' sites around town.'

# Churchyards to be blooming red

CHURCHYARDS and schools are to be filled with poppies to commemorate the First World War.

Five hundred churches including Kingsbridge and Dodbrook, Thurstone and West Alvington, and church of England schools including All Saints Primary, Thurstone, Charlton Primary, West Alvington Primary and Kingsbridge Community Primary School are planting poppies as part of the First World War commemorations organised by the Diocese of Exeter.

With the support of Fainton-based Sutton Seeds, the diocese has sent out 500 packets of the Northlew poppy seeds.

Northlew, a small village near Okehampton, lost proportionally more of its enlisted men than anywhere else in the UK, when 24 out of the adult male

population of just 100 were killed.

The Bishop of Crediton, Nick McKinnel said many churches were taking part in commemorations in their villages or towns, but this was an initiative that would unite churches and church schools in memory of those who had lost their lives from Devon.

He said: 'The poppy is such a strong symbol of the dreadful conflicts

of the 20th century. Filling our churchyards and church schools with poppies this year is a fitting way of marking the centenary of World War One.'

'We are especially pleased to have worked with Sutton Seeds to support Northlew, a tiny community which lost so many of its men.'

For every packet sold of the Northlew Poppy, Sutton Seeds are donating

£1 to the village to help them plant 20 miles of poppies along the route the men marched to join the war. Donations will also go towards building a new community shop called Memorial Stores.

Christopher Marson from the Northlew Memorial Society said: 'Purchasing our seeds has created such a stir of enthusiasm to the people of our village

and we are truly grateful for such an amazing gesture.'

'Northlew lost proportionally more young men from the enlisted population than any other town or place in the UK. Sutton seeds and our village decided to show the country that not only will we remember them, we did remember them, the poppy being the most profound of flowers to deliver not just a message of remembrance and peace but a message of hope to all those who see them.'

The participating churches in the South Hams are: Kingsbridge and Dodbrook, Charlton, Sherford, Slapton, Thurstone, Buckland Tout Saints, Woodleigh, Ringmore, Churchstow, Kingston, Moreleigh, East Portlemouth, East Allington, Aveton Gifford, Loddswell, Bigbury and West Alvington.

# The Rec gets a Green Flag

KINGSBRIDGE Recreation Ground has been awarded the prestigious national Green Flag Award – the first park in the South Hams to achieve such recognition.

The Award, which is run by a group of charities led by Keep Britain Tidy, is given to the country's best parks.

The site highly impressed the judges as a vibrant community park with quality attractions for all ages.

The Recreation Ground has benefited from a £400,000 investment over five years which has transformed the facilities and appearance of the park.

Although relatively small, the park now boasts high quality play spaces for children of all ages. There is an exciting younger children's area, a more challenging 'steep slope' play space for older children, a five-a-side kick-about area, putting green, petanque piste, two top quality tennis courts and public access to the bowling green.

A new café kiosk – Café Decks – also offers high quality food and drink.

The key to the park's success has been the community partnership that has driven

forward the improvements.

South Hams District Council has worked alongside a number of local organisations, including Kingsbridge Town Council, the Playspaces Group and Kingsbridge In Bloom.

SHDC Cllr Rufus Gilbert said: 'Alongside the significant investment by South Hams District Council, the excellent facilities reflect the hard work and commitment of local volunteers. They have been involved at every stage from designing to fundraising. They even did the hands-on building of some of the play features! It is a great example of people taking action for their environment and for their community.'

SHDC Cllr Keith Wingate said: 'This Green Flag Award is thoroughly deserved. It is a marvellous park – an asset to the town and a valued resource for the local community. I would like to thank the District Council's Greenspaces team, Kingsbridge in Bloom and the residents of Kingsbridge for putting in so much hard work. I look forward to seeing the Green Flag flying.'

Kingsbridge Mayor Irene Jeeninga said: 'I am really thrilled that

the Recreation Ground has won the Green Flag Award. Above all, this is testament to the terrific partnership working between the local authorities and community volunteer groups. The park really does provide something for everyone and I hope the people of Kingsbridge, and our many visitors, will continue to enjoy it in the years ahead.'

Graham Price added: 'We at Kingsbridge in Bloom are delighted that the Memorial Recreation Ground in Kingsbridge has been awarded a green flag award. It just adds to the fact that we are truly a lovely town which we should all be proud of. It is a wonderful public open space for everyone to enjoy and we are delighted that our local group together with others have been able to have played a major part in the funding, design and in our case the planting of the raised borders.'

This is a really good example of how local groups can work alongside the Town and District Councils.

Thanks to the support of the Kingsbridge Rotary Club we were able purchase plants to create a wonderful sensory garden which is tended by our mem-

bers throughout the year. The play spaces have also played a major role in helping create what must be one of the best play areas for young children in the area.

The bowls club and other facilities are just great and the fantastic Decks Café is the icing on the cake!
